Staff Sergeant Norman Frank Haas honorably served in the United States Army / SSGT Norman Haas was awarded the Bronze Star Medal in recognition of his outstanding performance of duties during the German campaign / SSgt Hass also earned two Battle Stars for combat action during the France and Germany campaigns

Base Assignments:

Camp Campbell, Kentucky - The camp was named in honor of Union Army Brigadier General William Bowen Campbell, the last Whig Governor of Tennessee / Constructed in January 1942, Camp Campbell was developed to accommodate one armored division and various support troops / From the summer of 1942 until the end of World War II, Camp Campbell was the training ground for the 12th, 14th and 20th Armored divisions, Headquarters IV Armored Corps and the 26th Infantry Division

Norman Haas was a retired plumber for Hastings Plumbing and was a member of Hamburg American Legion Post #527 / Norman Frank Haas passed away on 21 May 1997 at the age of 78 years old and is interred at Hillcrest Cemetery and Mausoleum, Hamburg, New York

The 14th Armored Division was an armored division of the United States Army assigned to the Seventh Army of the Sixth Army Group during World War II / The 14th Armored Division landed at Marseille in southern France, on 29 October 1944 / "Liberators" is the official nickname of the US 14th Armored Division / The division became known by its nickname during the last days of World War II when it liberated some 200,000 Allied prisoners of war from German prison camps / Among those liberated were approximately 20,000 American soldiers, sailors and airmen, as well as an estimated 40,000 troops from Great Britain and the Commonwealth / The 14th



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Armored Division was inactivated on 16 September 1945 at Camp Patrick Henry, Virginia

The European-African-Middle Eastern (EAME) Campaign Medal was a military award of the United States Armed Forces which was first created on 6 November 1942 by President Franklin D. Roosevelt / The medal was intended to recognize those military service members who had performed military duty in the European Theater (to include North Africa and the Middle East) and was awarded for any service performed between 7 December 1941 and 2 March 1946 / The European-African-Middle Eastern Campaign Medal was awarded as a service ribbon throughout the entire Second World War

The Bronze Star Medal is the fourth-highest individual military award and the ninth-highest by order of precedence in the US Military / It may be awarded for acts of heroism, acts of merit, or meritorious service in a combat zone

Battle (Combat) Stars were presented to military personnel who were engaged in specific battles in combat under circumstances involving grave danger of death or serious bodily injury from enemy action

The American Defense Service Medal (also referred to as the Pre-Pearl Harbor Ribbon) was a military award of the United States Armed Forces intended to recognize those military service members who had performed military duty between 8 September 1939 and 7 December 1941

The Good Conduct Medal is one of the oldest military awards of the United States Armed Forces / The Navy Good Conduct Medal was established in 1869, the Marine Corps version in 1896, the Coast Guard version in 1923, the Army version in 1941, and the Air Force version in 1963 / The medal is awarded to any active-duty enlisted member of the United States military who completes three consecutive years of "honorable and faithful service" / Such service implies that a standard enlistment was completed without any non-judicial punishment, disciplinary infractions, or court martial offenses

Kirtland Air Field, New Mexico - Located southeast of Albuquerque, New Mexico, the airfield was named in honor of the early Army aviator Col. Roy C. Kirtland / The field provided advanced flying training in "AT" (advanced trainer) trainer aircraft and transition training in combat-ready aircraft, primarily the B-17 Flying Fortress and the B-24 Liberator

Alfred N. Haberer passed away in 1979 at the age of 60 years old

The Boeing B-17 Flying Fortress was a four-engine heavy bomber aircraft developed in the 1930s for the United States Army Air Corps / The B-17 was primarily employed by the United States Army Air Forces (USAAF) in the daylight precision strategic bombing campaign of World War II against German industrial and military targets / The Consolidated B-24 Liberator was a heavy bomber, designed by Consolidated Aircraft / Often compared with the better-known Boeing B-17 Flying Fortress, the B-24 was a more modern design with a higher top speed, greater range, and a heavier bomb load; it was also more difficult to fly, with heavy control forces and poor formation-flying characteristics / The B-24 ended World War II as the most produced heavy bomber in history / At over 18,400 units, half by the Ford Motor Company, the B-17 Flying Fortress still holds the distinction as the most-produced American military aircraft

Cherry Point, North Carolina - Commissioned in 1942, Marine Corps Air Station Cherry Point or MCAS Cherry Point is a United States Marine Corps airfield located in Havelock, North Carolina / Cherry Point's primary World War II mission was to train units and individual Marines for service to the Pacific theater / The air station also served as a base for anti-submarine operations, with an Army Air Corps (22nd Antisubmarine Squadron) and later a Navy squadron each being responsible for the sinking of a German U-boat just off the North Carolina coast during 1943

The United States Fleet Marine Forces (FMF) were combined general and special purpose forces within the United States Department of the Navy that were designed in engaging offensive amphibious or expeditionary warfare and defensive maritime employment / During World War II, the Fleet Marine Force had units in the western Pacific assigned to the United States Asiatic Fleet

Amarillo Army Air Field (Amarillo, Texas) - Amarillo AAF was one of the largest installations in the Western Technical Training Command, established for training air crew and ground mechanics to service B-17 Flying Fortress aircraft / From 1943 to 1945 basic training and special courses of instruction were conducted, and the school was later designated to train technicians and flight engineers for B-29 aircraft in addition to the B-17 technical training

Dr. Leigh C. Hackford passed away on 19 December 2015 at the age of 98 years old and is interred at Oakwood Cemetery, East Aurora, New York

In the years from 30 June 1943 to 30 June 1945 the Medical Department trained 189 General Hospitals, 74 Field Hospitals and 61 Station Hospitals for overseas service / In 1945, when the peak of overseas shipments occurred, the War Department sent 81 General, 35 Field, and 8 Station Hospitals to the various Theaters of Operations (European, African and Asiatic-Pacific) / By May 1945, when the peak in Hospital beds overseas was reached, there were 335,000 fixed beds and about 87,000 mobile beds in all Theaters

The Air Transport Command (ATC) was a global instrument of the United States Army Air Forces with the mission to meet the urgent demand for the speedy reinforcement of the United States' military bases worldwide during World War II, using an air supply system to supplement surface transport / ATC also operated a worldwide air transportation system for military personnel

Robert James Hagner passed away on 6 October 1974 at the age of 51 years old and is interred at Hillcrest Cemetery and Mausoleum, Hamburg, New York

The job of a Motor Machinist's Mate was to operate, maintain, and repair (organizational and intermediate level) ship propulsion machinery, auxiliary equipment, and outside machinery, such as: steering engine, hoisting machinery, food preparation equipment, refrigeration and air conditioning equipment, windlasses, elevators, and laundry equipment / Operated and maintained (organizational and Intermediate level) marine boilers, pumps, forced draft blowers, and heat exchangers; perform tests, transfers, and inventory of lubricating oils, fuels, and water / Maintained records and reports, and performed duties in the generation and stowage of industrial gases

Operating as part of the United States Navy, the United States Coast Guard was given the mission to patrol and protect the shores of the United States, with a large role looking for enemy German submarines in the Atlantic Theater / The Coast Guard also rescued survivors from naval vessels near the U.S coast whether it be attacked merchant ships or sunken German U-Boats



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The USS General M. C. Meigs (AP-116), was a 11,828-ton troop transport / She played an important role in moving the Brazilian Expeditionary Force to Europe, making a series of voyages between the United States, Brazil, North Africa, and Italy / In October 1945 the transport joined the "Magic Carpet" fleet and during the next four months brought combat veterans back to the United States from France, India and Japan / Commissioned in June 1944 and decommissioned in March 1946

USS General Walter H. Gordon (AP-117) was a United States Navy troop transport and was commissioned on 29 Jun 1944 / Manned by the US Coast Guard, she operated in both the Europe-Africa-Middle East and Asiatic-Pacific Theaters / The USS Gordon made 12 voyages to various European and African ports in support of the accelerating Allied effort against the Axis / She carried supplies, troops, and took large numbers of German prisoners of war to the United States / In August 1945, The USS Gordon transported replacement troops for the Pacific campaigns, stopping at Ulithi and Manila to debark troops / The USS General Walter H. Gordon was decommissioned in April 1970 and scrapped in 1987

Coast Guard Cutter 83441 was a streamlined 83-foot patrol boat built in 1943 / The cutter had a 20-knot top speed and was well armed for chasing U-boats

The European-African-Middle Eastern Campaign Medal (EAME) was a military award of the United States Armed Forces which was first created on 6 November 1942 by President Franklin D. Roosevelt / The medal was intended to recognize those military service members who had performed military duty in the European Theater (to include North Africa and the Middle East) and was awarded for any service performed between 7 December 1941 and 2 March 1946 / The European-African-Middle Eastern Campaign Medal was awarded as a service ribbon throughout the entire Second World War

The Asiatic-Pacific Campaign Ribbon (Medal) was a military awarded to any member of the United States Military who served in the Pacific Theater from 1941 to 1945

A Marksmanship Badge is a military badge of the United States Armed Forces presented to personnel upon successful completion of a weapons qualification course or high placement in an official marksmanship competition / The U.S. Military's Marksmanship Qualification Badges are awarded in three grades (highest to lowest): Expert, Sharpshooter, and Marksman

Sampson, New York - In the three-and-a-half years of its operation during World War II, the Sampson Naval Training Station trained 411,429 naval recruits before closing in 1946 / The camp was named in honor of a local Seneca County native, Rear Admiral William T. Sampson, from Palmyra, NY, a hero of the Battle of Santiago during the Spanish-American War

NPSC (Naval Personnel Separation Center) (Lido Beach, New York) - When the Navy occupied Long Beach Island during World War II, the Lido Beach Towers Hotel became an amphibious base and discharge center

RB, TADCEN (Training and Distribution Center) (Shoemaker, California) - The Navy built facilities at Shoemaker to house, train, deploy and recuperate personnel who would construct, maintain and man ships, bases, depots, camps and facilities in the Pacific theatre of war

N.R.S. (Naval Reserve Station) (Buffalo, New York)

R.S. Reserve Station (San Francisco, California)

Miscellaneous:

In World War II, Naval pilots of landing craft were referred to as Coxswains / The coxswain was in charge of the vessel and all personnel on board / A coxswain controlled the boat's steering, speed, timing and fluidity / The primary duty of a coxswain was to ensure the safety of those in the boat



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USS Grady (DE-445) was a John C. Butler-class destroyer escort acquired by the U.S. Navy during World War II / The Grady was commissioned on 11 September 1944 / The primary purpose of the destroyer escort was to escort and protect ships in convoy, in addition to other tasks as assigned, such as patrol or radar picket / The Grady supported operations for the invasion of Iwo Jima, Saipan, Okinawa and the Philippines / The USS Grady received three battle stars for World War II Service / Decommissioned on 2 July 1946, the USS Grady was sold as scrap in June 1969

The Asiatic-Pacific Campaign Ribbon (Medal) was a military awarded to any member of the United States Military who served in the Pacific Theater from 1941 to 1945

The American Campaign Medal/Ribbon (also known as the (ATO) American Theater of Operations Ribbon) was a military award of the United States Armed Forces which was first created on November 6, 1942 by President Franklin D. Roosevelt / The ribbon was intended to recognize those military service members who had performed military duty in the American Theater of Operations during World War II / The requirements for the American Campaign Ribbon were for service within the American Theater between 7 December 1941 and 2 March 1946 / The American Campaign Medal was issued as a service ribbon only for the entirety of the Second World War, and was only made a full-sized medal in 1947

The World War II Victory Medal was first issued as a service ribbon referred to as the "Victory Ribbon" / By 1946, a full medal had been established which was referred to as the World War II Victory Medal / The medal commemorates military service during World War II and is awarded to any member of the United States military, including members of the armed forces of the Government of the Philippine Islands, who served on active duty, or as a reservist, between 7 December 1941 and 31 December 1946

The Philippine Liberation Medal was a military award of the Republic of the Philippines presented to any service member, of both Philippine Commonwealth and allied militaries, who participated in the liberation of the Philippine Islands between the dates of 17 October 1944 and 2 September 1945 / The Philippine Liberation Medal is intended to recognize military service in the last days of World War II when the military of Japan was driven from the Philippines and then to eventually surrender in September 1945 / To be awarded the medal, a service member must have served in the Philippines for at least thirty days during the eligible time period

Camp Davis, North Carolina - Camp Davis was built in 1940 and named for Statesville native Maj. Gen. Richmond P. Davis (1866-1937) / Originally designed predominantly as an Army coast artillery training center, Camp Davis hosted antiaircraft and seacoast defense training / Members of the Women's Air Force Service Pilots (WASPS) flew planes that towed the targets used in antiaircraft exercises / The installation also served briefly as the home of the army's first Barrage Balloon Training Center from 1941 to 1942

Miscellaneous:

With much of World War II fought in the air, anti-aircraft weapons were weapons that could specifically direct their offense against air targets / The mission of the Anti-Aircraft Artillery units were to detect hostile aircraft and destroy them / Radar aided antiaircraft gunners by providing accurate information about the range, speed, and altitude of incoming enemy planes

Pensacola Naval Air Station (NAS) (Pensacola, Florida) - Naval Air Station Pensacola was the primary training base for all Navy, Marine and Coast Guard aviators and Naval Flight Officers during World War II / Naval aviators from Pensacola NAS were called upon to train the Doolittle Raiders at Eglin Field in 1942 in carrier take-offs in their B-25 Mitchell bombers

Naval Air Station (NAS) (Whidbey Island, Washington) - Commissioned on 21 September 1942, NAS Whidbey operated for the re-arming and refueling of Navy patrol planes operating in defense of Puget Sound

Naval Auxiliary Air Station (NAAS) (Arlington, Washington) - The U.S. Naval Auxiliary Air Station in Arlington, Washington began in 1940 / In 1942, the Navy permitted the Army to develop the field as a strategic base for medium bombers to counteract the Japanese invasion of the Aleutians / By 14 August 1945 Arlington was a well-balanced station equipped to support two light carrier Air groups for either day or night operations

Naval Auxiliary Air Station (NAAS) (Corvallis, Oregon) - Primary mission of NAA Corvallis was to train pilots, copilots, navigators, radiomen, and crew chiefs

Navy Flight Preparatory School (NFPS), Colgate University (Hamilton, New York) - Colgate University participated



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in the Navy V-12 (Victory) Program which provided facilities to house, train, and feed Naval cadets learning aviation / The solid relationship forged between Colgate and the Navy led to the development of a V-12 unit comprising Navy and Marine enlisted men who were officer candidates / In July 1944, another Navy program, the V-7 served as an academic refresher course for men coming directly from the fleet and after completing a six- to 18-week course, they would head off to midshipman's school / The training programs on campus prepared more than 5,000 men for military service

Navy Flight Preparatory School (NFPS), University of North Carolina (Chapel Hill, North Carolina) - In February 1942, the United States Navy announced the establishment of a pre-flight school to train naval pilots on the campus of the University of North Carolina in Chapel Hill, N.C / During World War II, more than 25,000 men and women received military training at the University of North Carolina / In addition to the Navy Pre-Flight School, the university also hosted the Navy V-12 program and Naval ROTC (Reserve Officers Training Corps), as well as several Army programs, including the Pre-Meteorology program of the Army Air Corps, the Medical Army Specialized Training Program, and the Foreign Area and Language Study program

On 7 December 1941, Navy reserve sailors from Minnesota aboard the USS Ward fired the first U.S. shots of World War II by sinking a Japanese mini-submarine outside the entrance to Pearl Harbor / Over the course of the ensuing four years, the Navy would grow from a force of 383,150 to one that at its peak numbered 3,405,525, the vast majority of them reservists, including five future U.S. presidents

The American Campaign Medal/Ribbon (also known as the (ATO) American Theater of Operations Ribbon) was a military award of the United States Armed Forces which was first created on November 6, 1942 by President Franklin D. Roosevelt / The ribbon was intended to recognize those military service members who had performed military duty in the American Theater of Operations during World War II / The requirements for the American Campaign Ribbon were for service within the American Theater between 7 December 1941 and 2 March 1946 / The American Campaign Medal was issued as a service ribbon only for the entirety of the Second World War, and was only made a full-sized medal in 1947

A Marksmanship Badge is a military badge of the United States Armed Forces presented to personnel upon successful completion of a weapons qualification course or high placement in an official marksmanship competition / The U.S. Military's Marksmanship Qualification Badges are awarded in three grades (highest to lowest): Expert, Sharpshooter, and Marksman

The Good Conduct Medal is one of the oldest military awards of the United States Armed Forces / The Navy Good Conduct Medal was established in 1869, the Marine Corps version in 1896, the Coast Guard version in 1923, the Army version in 1941, and the Air Force version in 1963 / The medal is awarded to any active-duty enlisted member of the United States military who completes three consecutive years of "honorable and faithful service" / Such service implies that a standard enlistment was completed without any non-judicial punishment,

A bombardment group or bomb group was a group of bomber aircraft the United States Army Air Forces (USAAF) during World War II / It was the equivalent of an infantry regiment in the Army Ground Forces / A bombardment group was the key tactical control and administrative organization for bombers in all theaters of operation / U.S. bomb groups were numbered and classified into four types: Very Heavy (VH), Heavy (H), Medium (M), and Light (L) / Groups which combined bombers of differing categories into a single administrative organization were designated "Composite" groups

The European-African-Middle Eastern (EAME) Campaign Medal was a military award of the United States Armed Forces which was first created on 6 November 1942 by President Franklin D. Naval Air Station (NAS) (Santa Ana, California) - NAS Santa Ana was established in 1942 as Naval Lighter-Than-Air Station Santa Ana, a base for airship (blimps) operations in support of the United States Navy coastal patrol efforts during World War II / The predominant characteristic of the field was its two huge blimp hangars and was one of two new blimp bases on the west coast / Blimps were used to patrol America's coastline primarily to watch for enemy submarine / At first 6, then 12 blimps operated out of the station / The large, all-wood hangers were built to house the blimps and at the time of their construction were and still are the world's largest clear

Aviation Radio Technicians performed intermediate level maintenance on aviation components supported by conventional and automatic test equipment, including repair of weapons replaceable assemblies and shop replaceable assemblies and perform test equipment calibration/repair and associated test bench maintenance / Aviation Radio Technicians performed organizational level maintenance on aviation systems, to include: communications, radar, navigation, antisubmarine warfare sensors, fire control and tactical displays with associated equipment

USS Duluth (CL-87) was a United States Navy Cleveland-class light cruiser and was commissioned on 18 September 1944 / From 14 December 1944 to 2 March 1945, Duluth served as a training cruiser at Newport, Rhode Island / On 8 May 1945, she got underway to join the 5th Fleet and rendezvoused with the fast carriers on 27 May / Severe structural damage to her bow suffered in a typhoon 5 June forced her to return to Guam for repairs, but she rejoined Task Force (TF) 38 on 21 July 1945 to screen during the final air strikes on the Japanese homeland which continued until the end of the war / The USS Duluth was decommissioned on 25 June 1949 and sold as scrap in November 1960

When America suddenly found itself at war following the attack on Pearl Harbor, military planners in Washington realized they had neither the warships nor aircraft to defend more than 12,000 miles of U.S. coastline against enemy submarines lurking off shore / Short on options, the U.S. Navy turned to some decidedly outdated technology to bolster the nation's maritime defenses – blimps / Beginning in 1942 and continuing through to the end of the war, armed naval airships carried out non-stop patrols high above American waters in search of Japanese subs and German U-boats / Military blimps also shepherded vulnerable convoys far out into the Atlantic, while entire squadrons of lighter-than-air flying machines swept foreign sea-lanes of both mines and raiders

The Chief of Naval Operations approved the merger of the Service Force Aviation Repair Unit and Advanced Cruiser Aircraft Training Unit, established in October 1941 and June 1942 respectively, to form a Scout Observation Service Unit (SOSU) with a mission to maintain battleship and cruiser aircraft and to indoctrinate pilots in their specialized operations

The Fourteenth Air Force (14 AF) was established by the special order of President Roosevelt on 10 March 1943/ Claire Chennault was appointed the commander and promoted to Major General / The "Flying Tigers" of 14 AF (who adopted the "Flying Tigers" designation from the AVG) conducted highly effective fighter and bomber operations along a wide front that stretched from the bend of the Yellow River and Tsinan in the north to Indochina in the south, from Chengtu and the Salween River in the west to both East and South China Seas and the island of Formosa in the east / They were also instrumental in supplying Chinese forces through the airlift of cargo across "The Hump" in the China-Burma-India theater / By the end of World War II, 14 AF had achieved air superiority over the skies of China and established a ratio of 7.7 enemy planes destroyed for every American plane lost in combat / Overall, military officials estimated that over 4,000 Japanese planes were destroyed or damaged in the China-Burma-India theater during World War II / In addition, they estimated that air units in China destroyed 1,100,000 tons of shipping, 1,079 locomotives, 4,836 trucks and 580 bridges / The United States Army Air Corps credits 14 AF with the destruction of 2,315 Japanese aircraft, 356 bridges, 1,225 locomotives and 712 railroad cars / The 14th Air Force was reassigned to Continental Air Command and moved to Robins AFB, Georgia, in October 1949

The Military Police provides expertise in police, detainment and stability operations in order to enhance security and enable mobility / In World War II, Military Police soldiers moved traffic along the Burma Road, supported amphibious operations on Normandy beachheads, and managed enemy prisoners of war from Italy to the South Pacific

Infantry refers to soldiers moving and fighting on foot, armed with hand weapons such as rifles, machine guns, grenades, mortars, etc.

In preparation for the July 1943 invasion of Sicily, the amphibious 2 ½-ton truck, known as the DUKW, became available and General Dwight D. Eisenhower considered it one of the most valuable pieces of equipment produced by the United States during the war / Eisenhower created an amphibious truck battalion out of forces already in North Africa / On 28 May 1943, the 53rd Quartermaster Truck Battalion was constituted in the US Army and was activated on 22 June 1943 in French Morocco, North Africa, and served in the Tunisia Campaign with personnel and equipment from the previously organized 2637th Quartermaster Truck Battalion (Provisional) /

The 53rd Battalion initially received 109 DUKWs and became the first amphibious battalion just in time for the amphibious assault on Sicily / After the initial landings, the 53rd Battalion delivered tanks, heavy weapons and anti-tank pieces with ammunition / From 9 September through 1 October, the amphibians hauled cargo across the beaches until the port of Naples was secure with as many as 600 DUKWs conducted ship-to-shore missions at Naples / The battalion also participated in the Rome-Arno, Rhineland and Central Europe Campaigns and in Germany it hauled supplies across the Rhine River / On 12 November 1945, the battalion was inactivated in Germany

The Liberty ships, a vast new fleet for the war effort, were built in a national "Virtual Shipyard" that harnessed skills, resources, and facilities all across America / From 1941 to 1945, the United States increased its shipbuilding capacity by more than 1,200% and produced over 2,700 Liberty Ships, 800 Victory Vessels, 320 T-2 Tankers, and various other commercial and naval auxiliary vessels for a total of 5,200 ships constructed for the period / A Liberty ship was designed to carry about 10,000 tons of cargo, but in wartime conditions often carried much more. Liberty ships were nicknamed "ugly ducklings" by President Franklin Delano Roosevelt

In time of war or national emergency, the U.S. Merchant Marine becomes vital to national security as a "fourth arm of defense" / Merchant ships bore the brunt of delivering military troops, supplies and equipment overseas to our forces and allies operating as an auxiliary unit to the Navy

Seabees: After the attack on Pearl Harbor on 7 December 1941, and the use of civilian labor in war zones became impractical so the Navy created Construction Battalions (from which the abbreviation "C.B." became Seabees) / The Seabees have a history of building bases, bulldozing and paving thousands of miles of roadway and airstrips, bridges, roads, gasoline storage tanks, and Quonset huts for warehouses, hospitals, and housing

Manus Island is part of Manus Province in northern Papua New Guinea and is the largest of the Admiralty Islands / In 1942, Japan established a military base on Manus Island / Manus Island was attacked by United States forces in the Admiralty Islands campaign of February–March 1944 / An Allied naval base was established at Seadler Harbor on the island and it later supported the British Pacific Fleet

Aloe Army-Air Force (AAF) Base (Victoria, Texas) - Aloe Army-Air Force Base was established on 28 July 1942 / Its mission was an advanced single-engine training field for fighter pilots / Aloe also became the new home of the Lake Charles Army Flying School, which relocated from Lake Charles, Louisiana / Its training unit was the 347th Aviation Squadron, which used the North American AT-6 Texan, Curtiss P-40 Warhawk and lastly Republic P-47 Thunderbolts / Cadets were schooled in flying and in ground and aerial gunnery / During its use as a training airfield, Aloe had a total of 4 satellite fields / Aloe AAF was inactivated on 31 October 1945

Roosevelt / The ribbon was intended to recognize those military service members who had performed military duty in the American Theater of Operations during World War II / The requirements for the American Campaign Ribbon were for service within the American Theater between 7 December 1941 and 2 March 1946 / The American Campaign Medal was issued as a service ribbon only for the entirety of the Second World War, and was only made a full-sized medal in 1947

The World War II Victory Medal was first issued as a service ribbon referred to as the "Victory Ribbon" / By 1946, a full medal had been established which was referred to as the World War II Victory Medal / The medal commemorates military service during World War II and is awarded to any member of the United States military, including members of the armed forces of the Government of the Philippine Islands, who served on active duty, or as a reservist, between 7 December 1941 and 31 December 1946

The Good Conduct Medal is one of the oldest military awards of the United States Armed Forces / The Navy Good Conduct Medal was established in 1869, the Marine Corps version in 1896, the Coast Guard version in 1923, the Army version in 1941, and the Air Force version in 1963 / The medal is awarded to any active-duty enlisted member of the United States military who completes three consecutive years of "honorable and faithful service" / Such service implies that a standard enlistment was completed without any non-judicial punishment, disciplinary infractions, or court martial offenses

USS Frybarger was a Buckley-class destroyer escort of the United States Navy, named for Private First Class Raymond Frybarger, Jr. (1923–1942), who was awarded the Navy Cross posthumously for his heroism during the Battle of Edson's Ridge on Guadalcanal / The USS Frybarger arrived at Manus Island on 23 January 1945, and began escort duty to and in the Philippines until 30 August / Ports of call for her during this assignment included the Carolines; Lingayen Gulf, Manila, and Zamboanga in the Philippines; Hollandia; and on one voyage, Okinawa / Commissioned on 18 May 1944 and decommissioned on 30 June 1947

USS Cleveland (CL-55) was the lead ship and one of the 27 United States Navy Cleveland-class light cruisers completed during or shortly after World War II / Commissioned on 15 June 1944, she was the second ship to be named for the city of Cleveland, Ohio and saw extensive service in the war, briefly in the Atlantic, and then in the Pacific theater / Like almost all of her sister ships, she was decommissioned shortly after the end of the war, and

never saw active service again / The USS Cleveland was decommissioned on February 1947 and scrapped in the early 1960s

USS New York (BB-34) was a United States Navy battleship, the lead ship of her class / Named for New York State, she was designed as the first ship to carry the 14-inch (356 mm)/45-caliber gun / Commissioned on 1 May 1914, she saw her first combat in World War II against coastal artillery during Operation Torch around Casablanca in North Africa, and later became a training ship / Late in the war, she moved to the Pacific, and provided naval gunfire support for the invasion of Iwo Jima and later the invasion of Okinawa / Returning to Pearl Harbor for repairs until the end of the war, she was classified obsolete and decommissioned on 29 August 1946 / She was chosen to take part in the Operation Crossroads nuclear weapon tests at Bikini Atoll in 1946 / She survived both explosions and the effects of radiation on the ship were studied for several years / She was eventually sunk as a target in 1948 / She received three battle stars for her service

The USS Tryon (APH-1) was commissioned on 30 September 1942 as an evacuation transport / The Tryon left San Diego on 9 October 1942 bound for New Caledonia / On 7 November 1942, she arrived at Noumea; joined the Service Squadron, South Pacific; and remained with that organization for the next 15 months, evacuating combat casualties from the Solomons to Suva, Noumea, Wellington, Auckland, and Brisbane / On her return trips to the forward areas, she carried priority cargo and troops for forces fighting the Japanese / Tryon's first combat duty came in the Marianas during the summer of 1944 / On 16 July 1944, she joined Task Force 51 at Lunga Point and sortied for the invasion of Tinian / The hospital transport arrived off the beaches on the 24th, combat loaded with troops and equipment / After unloading, she embarked casualties for a week and then got underway for the Marshalls / The ship called at Eniwetok, New Caledonia, Espiritu Santo, and the Russell Islands before anchoring off Guadalcanal on 27 August 1944 / Tryon embarked 1,323 Marines of the 1st Marine Division and sortied on 8 September 1944, with Transport Division 6 of Task Force 32, for the assault on the Palaus / She was off the beaches of Peleliu on the morning of the 15th and disembarked elements of the assault wave / Then, serving as a hospital evacuation ship, she embarked 812 combat casualties and, on the 20th, sailed out for Manus / She disembarked the patients at Seeadler Harbor four days later and headed back to Peleliu the next morning / The ship remained off the beaches from 28 September to 4 October and then joined a convoy bound for the Solomons / When Tryon arrived at Tulagi on 11 October 1944, she was assigned to the 7th Fleet to participate in the Leyte campaign / On 2 January 1945, Tryon sailed out of Manus with reinforcement group Task Group 77.9 for the invasion of Luzon on the beaches of the Lingayen Gulf / She arrived off San Fabian on the morning of the 11th and began unloading troops and supplies / From 13 to 27 January 1945, she received casualties on board and headed to Leyte Gulf where they were transferred to USS Hope (AH-7) and USS Bountiful (AH-9) / On 2 February, she joined a convoy and departed for the Solomons / The Tryon was routed to the Philippines, embarked occupation troops at Leyte, and joined a convoy for Japan on 1 September 1945 / The transport disembarked the troops at Yokohama and received liberated Allied prisoners of war on board for transportation to the Philippines, delivering them at Manila on 18 September 1945 / The USS Tryon was decommissioned on 20 March 1946 and transferred to the US Army on 17 July 1946 / The Tryon earned six battle stars

The Asiatic-Pacific Campaign Ribbon (Medal) was a military award given to any member of the United States Military who served in the Pacific Theater from 1941 to 1945

The Purple Heart was instituted in 1782 by George Washington and is the first and oldest military American decoration / The Purple Heart is awarded to military service members wounded or killed in action, in the latter case posthumously

In the years from June 30, 1943 to June 30, 1945 the Medical Department trained 189 General Hospitals, 74 Field Hospitals and 61 Station Hospitals for overseas service / In 1945, when the peak of overseas shipments occurred, the War Department sent 81 General, 35 Field, and 8 Station Hospitals to the various Theaters of Operations (European, African and Asiatic-Pacific) / By May 1945, when the peak in Hospital beds overseas was reached, there were 335,000 fixed beds and about 87,000 mobile beds in all Theaters
